An event fifty-five years in the making was held at the Shreveport Convention Center in downtown Shreveport. Southern University at Shreveport's (SUSLA) 55th Anniversary was held on Thursday, November 17th, "Honoring the Past & Building Capacity for the Future" was the theme that set the tone for an evening of reflection, inspiration, celebration, and the promise of vibrant future. The 55th Year Celebration honored the visionary founding leaders of North Louisiana's cultural gem, Southern University at Shreveport (SUSLA), the only two-year Historically Black College and University (HBCU) comprehensive community college that is also a constituent member of the Southern University and A&M College System.

SUSLA was created by Act 42 in 1964 to serve the Shreveport-Bossier City area. SUSLA opened its doors for instruction on September 19, 1967. Throughout the years, outstanding leadership has guided Southern University at Shreveport. Dr. Walter Austin served as the Institution's first chief executive officer, followed by Dr. Leonard C. Barnes. Upon the recommendation of President G. Leon Netterville to the State Board of Education, Dr. Barnes was appointed to serve as Vice President of the Shreveport Campus in July 1971. The Board of Supervisors for the Southern University System changed the title of Vice President to Chancellor in March 1977. As a result, Dr. Barnes continued to serve the University as Chancellor until July, 1987.

Dr. Robert H. Smith served as the University's third executive officer. Dr. Mary L. Wilson was appointed as the Interim Chancellor in June 1993. She was the first female chief executive of the university. In November, 1993 Dr. Jerome G. Greene, Jr. was named Chancellor of the university. In August 1998, Mr. S. Albert Gilliam was appointed Interim Chancellor (a position he would again hold in 2015).



In May, 1999, Dr. James C. Brown was named Chancellor. In October 2000, Dr. Press L. Robinson was named Interim Chancellor. In November, 2000, Southern University Board of Supervisors named Dr. Ray L. Belton as Chancellor, effective December 2000 through 2015. In 2016, Dr. Rodney A. Ellis was named Chancellor of the University.

In November 2021, the Southern University System Board of Supervisors named Dr. Vladimir A. Appeaning as SUSLA's Interim Chancellor effective January 2022. Under Dr. Appeaning's leadership, SUSLA posted its highest enrollment of 3,199 students for fall 2022 which marked in the highest enrollment over the last six (6) years and the third (3rd) highest enrollment in the history of the university. Other notable accomplishments under Dr. Appeaning's leadership include SUSLA's faculty salaries were raised to 100% of the SREB average by rank in June 2022; accreditation of the Nursing and Allied Health programs; expansion of SUSLA's academic inventory to include Cybersecurity, Engineering Technology with concentrations in Process Technology, Industrial Engineering Technology, and Electrical & Computer Engineering Technology; expansion of 2+2 opportunities for SUSLA students by evidenced by the signing of historic nursing affiliate agreements with SUBR and Grand Canyon University to launch a 100% online RN to BSN program; unveiling of SUSLA's Roy Griggs School of Business, purchasing a mobile health unit (JAG Mobile) to be delivered in Summer 2023, and the submission of Capital Outlay Requests in excess of \$74 Million for infrastructure improvements at SUSLA to include the renovation of the Louis Collier Science Building, the demolition and construction of a new Gymnasium and Health and Recreation Facility, the construction of a new Workforce Training Center focused on Data Analytics, the replacement of the plumbing system/water loop on the main campus, and renovation of the Library.

SUSLA's 55th year celebration was well attended by the Southern University System leadership, SUSLA faculty, staff and student body leaders, community leaders, local and state legislators, dignitaries, and public officials. Southern University President-Chancellor Dennis J. Shields offered remarks, while Mr. Henry Price and SUSLA's Interim, Dr. Vladimir A. Appeaning delivered the key note address focused on the event's theme: Honoring the Past and Building Capacity for the Future. The celebration concluded with an awards program for SUSLA's Champions, past and present.



Southern University at Shreveport History

HONORING THE PAST — HOW IT ALL BEGAN



Southern University at Shreveport, Louisiana, was established by Act 42 in 1964 by the Louisiana Legislature to serve the Shreveport-Bossier City area. Its primary emphasis was to provide the first two years of typical college and university coursework. Then Governor John H. McKeithen signed the Act on June 27, 1964, and the Institution officially opened its doors for instruction on September 19, 1967.

On October 28, 1974, the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education, currently the Board of Regents, granted the Institution approval to offer six associate degree programs: Business, Office Administration, Natural Sciences, Medical Office Assistant, Social Sciences, and Humanities.

Southern University at Shreveport is a unit of the Southern University System rather than a branch or extension of the Baton Rouge campus. Southern University at Shreveport – or SUSLA, originally known as SUSBO (short for Southern University Shreveport-Bossier) – holds a unique stance as not only the only two-year university in the SU (Southern University) system, but we are also the only two-year HBCU (Historically Black College and University) in the city and serving our region.

In 1977, the Board of Regents Master Plan for Higher Education in Louisiana cited, “Southern University should begin immediately to plan programs and services of the type appropriate to a comprehensive community college to contribute to the future economic development of the greater Shreveport area.” Therein, the Institution was charged to expand its one and two-year offerings in keeping with the workforce needs of the Shreveport area and to cooperate with nearby vocational-technical schools where possible. The Master Plan defined research activities as “appropriate to further the role of the Institution as a comprehensive community college, with lower-level undergraduate instruction and public service receiving top priority.”

Throughout the years, outstanding leadership has guided Southern University at Shreveport. Dr. Walter Austin served as the Institution’s first chief executive officer, followed by Dr. Leonard C. Barnes. Upon the recommendation of President G. Leon Netterville to the State Board of Education, Dr. Barnes was appointed to serve as Vice President of the Shreveport Campus in July 1971. Dr. Barnes continued to serve the University as Chancellor from March 1977 until July 1987. Dr. Robert H. Smith served as the University’s third executive officer, followed by Dr. Mary L. Wilson, Interim Chancellor, in June 1993 and the first woman chief executive of the University. In November 1993, Dr. Jerome G. Greene, Jr., was named Chancellor. In August 1998, S. Albert Gilliam answered the call to serve as Interim Chancellor (a position he would again occupy in 2015). In May 1999, Dr. James C. Brown was named Chancellor, and in October 2000, Dr. Press L. Robinson served as Interim Chancellor. In November 2000, the Southern University Board of Supervisors named Dr. Ray L. Belton as Chancellor, effective December 2000. Dr. Belton would serve in the most extended position he held until July 2016, when he was appointed President of the SU System and Chancellor for SU Baton Rouge. In 2016, Dr. Rodney A. Ellis was selected as Chancellor of the SUSLA campus. And, as of November 2021, Dr. Vladimir A. Apearing currently serves as Interim Chancellor at the Southern University at Shreveport campus.


